#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Directors Creek Co. RWD No. 5 Mannford, Oklahoma 74044-0698

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities of Creek Co. RWD No. 5, Mannford, Oklahoma, as of and for the year ended November 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

#### Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Creek Co. RWD No. 5, Mannford, Oklahoma has not presented the Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on these financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated April 25, 2017, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

Board of Directors Creek Co. RWD No. 5 Mannford, Oklahoma 74044-0698

We have audited the financial statements of the business-type activities of Creek Co. RWD No. 5 as of and for the year ended November 30, 2016, and have issued our report thereon, dated April 25, 2017. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Creek County Rural Water District No. 5, Mannford, Oklahoma has not presented the Management's Discussion and Analysis that the Governmental Accounting Standards Board requires to supplement, although, not be a part of the basic financial statements.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. There can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses have been identified. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

#### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion

on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed two (2) instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

#### CREEK COUNTY RURAL WATER DISTRICT NO. 5 SCHEDULE OF AUDIT RESULTS NOVEMBER 30, 2016

#### Findings - Financial Statement Audit

#### 16-01 – Reconciliations to General Ledger

<u>Condition</u>: We observed that the outstanding payments and reported cash balance appeared to be inaccurate and reconciliation from the bank statement to the general ledger did not appear to be done in a timely manner and on a monthly basis. The general ledger misreported the ending *operating account* position by \$9,299.26 less than on the reconciled bank balance. The beginning *operating account* balance reported less by \$2,555.71 with no explanation provided. The general ledger misreported the beginning and ending *reserve fund* position by \$3,500.00 less than the reconciled bank balance. The general ledger misreported the ending *construction account* cash position by \$37,757.59 more than reported on the bank statement. The beginning *construction account* cash balance reported less by \$2,500.00 than the actual reconciled bank balance with no explanation provided.

<u>Criteria</u>: Monthly reconciliations to bank statements should be performed and any items that have not cleared or are in error, should be identified and documented.

<u>Effect</u>: Not reconciling to a monthly bank statement may cause cash ledgers to become out of balance and not represent the reported account's actual position accurately.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend reconciliations be performed and any differences between the cash ledger and bank statement be documented until any outstanding items can be resolved.

#### 16-02 - Payroll

<u>Condition</u>: During our final audit work, we observed some payroll tax deposits that were not paid timely.

<u>Criteria</u>: Payroll should be processed with all applicable withholdings, matchings and reporting made complete and intact.

<u>Effect</u>: Not processing payroll with all required payroll withholdings and not reporting timely will result in penalties and fees for the District.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that the District investigate the amount of unpaid taxes and resolve these issues to minimize the amount of penalties and interest from unpaid payroll taxes.

#### Note 1 - Summary of significant accounting policies

#### **Reporting Entity**

Creek County Rural Water District No. 5 is an independent, self-contained reporting entity with no associated component units. It is operated in a manner similar to a private business enterprise where the cost of providing water services is financed through user charges.

#### Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles promulgated in the United States of America. The accounting and financial reporting treatment is accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and liabilities associated with the operation are included on the balance sheet. The operating statements present increases and decreases in net total assets. Depreciation expense is provided for capital assets based upon estimated useful lives.

Financial activity is accounted for on the flow of economic resources measurement focus using the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred.

#### **Accounts Receivable**

All accounts greater than thirty days are considered past due. Receivables greater than ninety days were deemed uncollectible in the current year and netted from water revenue.

#### Inventory

Inventory is expensed when used and the amount on hand is deemed to be an immaterial amount.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment is recorded at cost when purchased. Depreciation expense is recorded using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset. Water line extensions and improvements are depreciated using a 50-year life. Water system improvements constructed by the District include capitalizing the direct cost of materials and labor. If an asset is permanently impaired in value, the asset cost is written down to market value. The District capitalizes assets with a useful life in excess of one year with a cost of \$250 or more. Line extension costs reimbursed by the customer are not capitalized and accordingly not depreciated.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, shown in the financial statements, are amounts that are not subject to fluctuations in principal value due to changing market conditions and have a maturity of less than three months. A following is a breakdown of cash:

#### **Custodial Credit Risk**

At November 30, 2016, the District held deposits of approximately \$437,603 at financial institutions. The District's cash deposits are not entirely covered by Federal Depository Insurance.

#### Federal Income Tax

The District is exempt from federal and state income taxes.

#### Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

At November 30, 2016, no determination of the aggregate dollar value of vacation and sick pay had been made.

#### **Debt Reserve Fund**

Under the loan agreement signed with Rural Development, the District is required to maintain debt reserve funds. The balances restricted for this purpose at November 30, 2016 are as follows:
